FAA Issues Gyroplane LODA

Steve Craft of Hebron, KY has secured a new Letter of Deviation Authority from the FAA to offer flight instruction for compensation in an Experimental Amateur Built gyroplane, the first issued by the FAA since at least 2008. The FAA's instructions to local Field Service District Offices (FSDO) were withdrawn in 2008, as changing policy on E-LSA caught gyros in its wake.




Welcome to...

March 12 - The meeting was called to order at 10:05am MST by President Doug Barker at Airgyro Aviation. Attendance included five members and three guests, including one member and one guest online.

Minutes of January and February meetings were approved as published. The treasurer's report was relayed by Doug, who reported \$327.05 in savings, \$437.46 in checking, \$576.34 in the PayPal account, for a total of \$1,340.85 on hand. The report was accepted.

Doug reported membership currently stands at 41. Six members took advantage of the special four-year renewal option intended to raise funds to pursue incorporation and IRS 501(c)(3) status. They are: Kevin Eaton, Roger Guzman, Glenn Kerr, Claudius Klimt, Paul Plack and Kevin Richey. Doug reported that the incorporation process has been started with Biz Central USA, which quoted total fees of \$434.64. With the additional \$400 fee required by the IRS to file

for not-for-profit status, and other smaller miscellaneous taxes and fees, the total cost is expected to be about \$900. Doug commented that due to the simplicity of our organization, the process might be complete in time for Rotors Over The Rockies (ROTR) in June.

Doug announced that our next meeting on April 9 will again be at Airgyro. It is anticipated that the May 14 meeting will be held at the hangar of VP Curt Pittman at Brigham City Airport in preparation for ROTR.

Doug announced upcoming events including Bensen Days, April 6-11 at Wauchula, FL; ARC Days, May 13-15 at San Manuel Airport in Arizona; ROTR, June 9-11 at Brigham City, UT; and the weekend of September 23-25, when the Ken Brock Freedom Fly-In at El Mirage and the Wendover Wheels & Wings event present a calendaring conflict.

It appears the Hill Air Force Base Open House & Airshow scheduled for that same weekend will be canceled.

Doug is also planning a trip to Texas to pick up a Bensen gyroglider for use as a boom trainer. This presents an opportunity to carpool with Doug, get a tour of The Butterfly LLC, and receive instruction in a boom trainer from Brian Booth at North Texas Gyroplanes. Anyone interested should contact Doug ASAP.

Welcome to our guests and introductions: Jeff Whitebear is a local resident with a life long desire to fly and is checking out the gyro scene. Phil Mortello is a local helicopter pilot (with a commercial and instrument rating) who is close to having his CFI and is also checking into gyro's.

Unanimous vote to approve the minutes for the Feb 5, 2011 meeting (as printed in Western Rotorcraft). Treasurer's report: \$626.97 in the Vantage West Savings account.

Britta P and Mark R noted that for next year they would like to have others think about stepping into a leadership role – this is a way to introduce new people with new ideas.



Chapter 73 President Bob Johnson reports, "Due to very busy schedules it seems that the club's March meeting notification to its members never were formally posted. Even though a few diehard members did show up on March 12th and hung out with the Sport Copter crew.

"Here is something about what you missed at the last meeting from your VP."



"Here are a few thoughts on Saturday's non-meeting. Jim Shawcross and I had a long conversation with Jim Vanek. Jim went to the LSA Airshow in Sebring, FL and flew one of the LSA gyroplanes (MT03) from Germany. He had quite a bit to say about the various gyros and LSA aircraft in general. I wasn't thinking about a report for the Newsletter or I would have taken notes. He also talked about why Gyros tend to roll over when landing and how his landing gear system on the Sport Copter II solves the problem, making it easier and safer to land than fixed wing

aircraft. A few other gyros have started using a castering nose wheel, like the Sport Copter, but none can be dropped to a landing as well as the Sport Copter II. He talked about the many Gyros being produced and sold overseas. He feels that with the improvements being made to Gyros, and more gyro friendly FAA regulations, especially to include gyroplanes in the LSA market like they have in Europe, would create a surge in gyroplane interest in the USA. Jim will be at the next meeting and will give a talk about his trip to the LSA show in Florida and add more details about the European gyroplanes.



"Jim also showed us what he is doing to solve engine overheating on the Sport Copter II (SCII). They tried all sort of cowling and baffle arrangements to no avail. They now are getting it fixed with a fan arrangement. The fan is driven by the engine and not an electric fan as tried by at least one other manufacturer. He has an engine mounted and enclosed in a wooden box with the fan to cool it, and it has proved effective. I believe Jim expects to have the SCII ready very soon." (James Miller, PRA 73 VP.)


