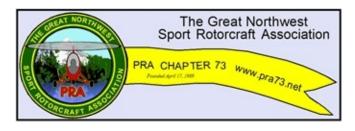
Bonneville GyroFlyers PRA Chapter 2 January 12 Meeting Report

Also in attendance for the business meeting were Secretary Paul Plack (UT), Treasurer Steve Pearson (UT) and members Kevin Eaton (UT) and Claudius Klimt (MD, pictured above). Joining the

webcast during the following technical presentation were guests Mark Shook (CO, President, PRA 38), Randolph Palma (FL), Curt Pittman (UT), Robert McElroy (TX), Russell Owens (CA), CFI Brock Steiner (OR) and Alex Jacobson (no location entered).

Following a welcome to members and guests, the minutes of the November, 2012 meeting were approved as published in the December, 2012 issue of Western Rotorcraft. Doug reported no update to November's treasury balance of \$180. A brief discussion of the 2013 calendar followed, and Doug encouraged all present to support rotorcraft events in the coming year.

Doug announced that the February 9 meeting would again be held online at 10am MST. The meeting was adjourned at 10:12am. (Paul Plack, Secretary)



January 12 Meeting Report

Meeting called to order by Jon Dailey at 1:16 PM, on 12 January 2013. Bob read the financial report.

A brief discussion of guns and gun control was opened, with the announcement that Wyoming has introduced a bill into the State's legislation, proposing to prohibit the enforcement of federal gun control measures, and to make it a felony to enforce such a federal control.

The sale of additional raffle tickets was conducted and closed. The raffle drawing was conducted, with the winner being ticket #607. The winner being Richard E.

Jon brought up the suggestion that the club should pay 100% of Bob's dues to NWAAC. This was in light of PRA73's frequent use of the NWAAC clubhouse during the winter. This was agreed upon by the attending members, and closed. Bob announced the upcoming events occurring at Scappoose airfield: August 10th: Car show occurring at the airport, requesting a gyro club presence. August16-18: NWAAC air show, again requesting a gyro club presence and volunteers to assist in aircraft control and parking. August 24th: Wings and Wheels, question to group participation (no resolution as yet).

An announcement that our current Club Vice President, Jim, will be stepping down due to health issues. The VP position is open, and the request has been made for another member to fill the office position.

A discussion of the December Vortex Crash was opened with an inquiry to the floor, concerning any further investigative results. Speculation is toward a pre-existing medical condition as the contributing factor.

The Alvord desert camping trip was announced for June 15-22. This will follow one week after the Utah ROTR event (occurring June 6-8). It was expressed that the Alvord being a dry lake bed is 3 times larger than El Mirage, and several members are planning on attending this trip. There will be Gyros, Powered Kites, and R/C. This is a primitive site, with a hot spring. Also, locally there is a diner and fuel station, where gyros are allowed to land on the road and taxi.

A new CFI will soon be working with Sport Copter. He is David Burkhardt.
